Prepares students to evaluate, design, and conduct research in communication. Develops research-related writing strategies and proficiency. Writing intensive; meets University Written Communication requirement.

*HU 2642: Introduction to Digital Media (2016 – 2024)

Basic principles, practices and implications of digital media communication and production. Provides foundation in tools, techniques and processes through hands-on production, readings, discussion and analysis of contemporary issues related to digital media.

*HU 4890: Special Topics in Communication: Sound & Culture (2018, 2020, 2022) This course explores the meanings and significance of sound and noise. We will learn to think about sound as historical, cultural, architectural, and ecological, as well as aesthetic.

*HU 3800: Media & Society (2017)

Examines contemporary forms of mediated communication. Emphasis on understanding media economics and impacts of media on attitudes, values, behavior, and identity. Topics may include propaganda, advertising, political communication, journalism, media violence, social media, surveillance, and media policy.

HU 2820: Communication & Culture (2015, 2016, 2022)

Introduction to the ways that communication creates and maintains culture. Considers a variety of perspectives on the significance of communication.
